Developmental Delay

Delay in development occurs when the child fails to attain developmental milestones as compared to peers from the same population. It is caused by impairment in any of the following distinct domains. such as gross and fine motor, speech and language. cognitive and performance, social, psychological, sexual, and activities of daily living (ADL). It can be isolated (involving a single domain), multiple (involving two or more domains, or global (affecting most developmental areas). In order to avoid long term disability, early detection, and intervention is warranted. This activity reviews the role of the interprofessional team in the comprehensive evaluation of developmental delay using standardized developmental surveillance and screening instruments in addition to lab workup and imaging.



Project Impact

Project ImPACT is recognized as one of the most effective coaching programs for parents of young children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and related social communication delays. Project ImPACT teaches parents strategies they can use to help their child develop social, communication, imitation, and play skills during daily routines and activities. Project ImPACT is supported by research and based on developmental science and applied behavioral analysis (ABA) principles. It is considered a Manualized Intervention Meeting Criteria by the National Clearinghouse on Autism Evidence and Practice (NCAEP).

Why is functional communication important?

Functional Communication Training (FCT) is an antecedent intervention, which can be used with all types and levels of communication. An appropriate replacement behaviour would be to functionally communicate needs and wants, which will gain the learner access to the reinforcer.

Once the <u>function</u> of the challenging behaviour is determined, instructors can use a <u>DRA</u> procedure to provide the reinforcer for more socially appropriate behaviour.



What does functional communication look like?



Functional Communication Training can include vocal communication, such as full sentences "Can I have the car toy?", or even a single word "car".

It can also include picture and/or text cues that can be exchanged. Think of handing a picture of a car toy to the other person, so they can identify what item is being requested.

Additionally, using high—tech AAC devices can include pressing buttons to say "I want car" on a speech—generating device is also considered FCT.

Sign language, gestures, pointing, and other forms of non-verbal communication can be taught through functional communication training.

Why do learners engage in challenging behaviors

These challenging behaviours can be seen as 'problems' for others, but as 'solutions' for the learner. These behaviours get their needs met. Hitting others has worked in the past, so hitting others will continue to be used because it works.

Communicating in appropriate ways can be difficult, require a lot of time and effort, or not be in the learner's current repertoire of skills.


